2019 Daily Devotionals for Advent & Christmas Day

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, STARKVILLE

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INTRODUCTION

An Invitation to Turn to Jesus' Songbook and Prayer Book – *the Psalter* – to Prepare and Pray for His Coming and His Kingdom.

In Jesus' ministry and teaching recorded in the New Testament, which Old Testament book does Jesus quote more than any other? As Jesus left the Upper Room and made his way toward Gethsemane—preparing for the Cross—from which Old Testament book was Jesus singing? Of Jesus' "Seven Last Words" from the Cross, three were direct quotations from the Old Testament; from which one OT book did your dying Savior recite each of those three times? The answer to all of these questions is the Book of Psalms, the *Tehillim* of Israel.

Over half of the Psalms come from Jesus' kingly ancestor David. God called David "a man after my own heart," and to David the LORD made special covenant promises about the coming Messiah and the Messiah's eternal kingdom. So meditating upon, praying and singing the Psalms is essential to knowing and following Jesus. Meditating, praying, and singing the Psalms is also essential to preparing and praying for Jesus' return and Kingdom.

In this Advent Devotional, you will spend time with Jesus in passages from his "favorite book" – Israel's Book of Praises, Israel's central book of songs and prayers. I have selected verses from Psalms for our focus and spiritual reflection in this season of repentance and renewal, hope and fulfillment – as we remember Christ's first coming and look forward to his return. Then, for each day from December 1 (Advent's Day 1 this year) through Christmas Day, there is a devotional and guided prayer from one of our church officers or a member of our ministry staff. Each writer has responded specifically and personally to his or her given passage. We also again this year feature artwork from some of FPC's children who have responded to some of the key Scripture and themes.

"Advent" (from the Latin word *adventus*) means "coming." The Season of Advent opens the Christian worship year. The season provides as special time for us to remember that God's

Word calls us to not only to repentant and joyful preparation for Christmas. God's Word calls us also to repentant and joyful openness for Christ's coming into our hearts and for Christ's ultimate return as Judge and King.

God's Word in the passages from the Psalms highlighted in this devotional proclaim the incredible Good News that all of Israel's, all of David's, and all of our best hopes and dreams for blessing, light, and life can be known in the One person whose face was first seen when He was born and laid in a manger. In Jesus' Holy Face shines all of God's glory for our salvation!

May you see his Face and know his Grace this Advent and Christmas. May you move through enter the New Year truly renewed in your King's blessings.

First Sunday of Advent

Daily Reading: Psalm 67: 1-4


"The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you. The LORD lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace.' So shall they put my Name upon the people of Israel, and I will bless them."[Numbers 6:24-27, the "Aaronic Benediction" that the LORD commands Moses to have Aaron and his sons impart to the LORD's people.] The central hope, prayer, and promise of the great priestly benediction are all about the LORD's all-glorious, all-gracious Face shining upon his people.

Psalm 67 connects that great benediction of Advent hope—
the LORD's OWN FACE SHINING UPON HIS PEOPLE, ISRAEL—with
God's gospel mission to bring his salvation and joy to ALL nations
and people. May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his
face to shine upon us, Selah, so that your way may be known on
earth, your saving power among all nations. [e.s.] Let the peoples
praise You, O God; let all the peoples praise You! Let the nations
be glad and sing for joy, for you judge the peoples with equity and
guide the nations upon earth, Selah. [Psalm 67:1-4] This
prophecy was fulfilled in Christ's coming.

The gospel of God's Kingdom is this: (A) "Joy to the World, the Lord Is Come!" and; (B) He has made HIS OWN FACE – from the Manger, from the Cross, and from Heaven – shine upon all his people in the fullness of his saving grace, truth, and glory. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. [John 1:14] May you know the ultimate blessing of everlasting life in the LORD's glorious face shining upon you to save, love, and bless you.

Daily Prayer: Father, please give me eyes to see and a heart to receive the saving grace and glory of your Son's face shining upon

us and blessing us. By your Spirit, lead me to live in your blessings and to share your blessings with others – even among all nations to the end of the earth. In Jesus' Name I pray, Amen.

Daily Reading: Psalm 130: 3-8

Advent is an anticipatory season in which we look to the coming of the promised Messiah. The question that naturally follows is this: "Why exactly are we looking?" The psalmist answers us well. "If you, O LORD, should mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand?" We are desolate sinners with no hope outside of this Messiah, so the psalmist points our affections to God and his trustworthy promises. He says, "I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope." By God's providence, you and I have found ourselves on the side of history where we can look to and hope in the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ. In him, there is "steadfast love and plentiful redemption."

Do you understand your relationship to God without Christ, that you are a sinner who cannot bear the burden of your own iniquities? Do you hope in the Word who is able to bear and has already borne those iniquities in your place, or do you rely on something else? Friend, the work of the cross is finished! The Lord has truly redeemed Israel from its iniquities! Because we know that he has fulfilled his promises in giving us the Messiah and redeeming a people for himself, we can continue to place our hope in the Word who never fails and who will bring his redemptive work to glorious completion.

Daily Prayer: Heavenly Father, you are an awesome and glorious promise-keeper; give me grace by the power of your Holy Spirit to entrust my to your perfect promises and to hope in your Word, Jesus Christ.

Daily Reading: Psalm 51: 9-14

"Hide your face from my sins and blot out all my iniquities." Reading over this passage I am struck more and more with this first verse. The words David uses throughout this Psalm are so vivid in describing a person wrestling with their own sinfulness. Part of living in Christ is realizing how filthy our sins make us before our holy God. But there is good news, because God does not hide His face or simply blot out our iniquities. Jesus saves and redeems completely. The Psalm lists several amazing things God does for those who repent: He creates, renews, restores, and sustains the new man in us. The Bible does not fail to show us our fleshly faults, and conviction from our faith in Jesus is a trial we should be joyous through. For me, it has always been so encouraging to read these kinds of passages because there is no double standard and no tricks. Where else are bad times and struggles so clearly shown next to the path of true peace and joy? Nowhere but in the Word. Nowhere but in Christ.

As wonderfully personal as this message is, we must not stop at ourselves in its application. Moreover, the scripture here shows that this act of God cleansing us is to one end: making His name known and praising Him. We do not place our salvation in a quiet place within ourselves to admire it whenever we are brought low in life. No, we must bring Jesus' powerful work in us to others to teach those who do not know and convert the lost back to the found in Jesus. Then all can sing praises to the One who deserves all praise and glory. May that day come quickly.

Daily Prayer: Dear Lord, I give thanks to You this day for every good and perfect thing you have given. Your blessings are continually poured out on this sinner. I pray that You would carry out Your Word in me, that you would create in me a clean heart and renew a steadfast spirit within me. Amen.

December 4, 2019 – Joe Nasvytis

Daily Reading: Psalm 94: 12-15

The psalmist highlights the blessedness of the person who receives God's life-giving revelation of His words from God's law. For the person who "delights in the law of the Lord and meditates on it day and night" as Psalm 1 explains, God makes everything he does prosper. The promise of God's justice through His words give rest to those who long for justice and deliverance from the wicked. God's words also give us hope in God's promises to never forsake or abandon us. Advent is a time we focus on Jesus' coming, who promised to give rest to the souls of those who're weary and burdened. Jesus gives us rest by conquering our enemies of sin, death, and hell as the Apostle Paul says, "Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?...57 But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." (1Cor. 15:55, 57)

To those of us who're tempted to turn the holidays into a time of hustling and bustling, shopping, and stress, God offers us rest for our souls when we come to Jesus. To those of us who're worried about potential conflicts with family members, God offers us His continual presence to cheer and to guide through Jesus. Jesus the Great Shepherd equips us with everything good to do His will, and He'll never leave us or forsake us. Our hope in life and death is in Him during this season, "who gives life to the dead and calls things that are not as though they were." (Rom. 4:17)

Daily Prayer: Dear God, when I'm stressed, worried or weary, help me to keep delighting in your word and coming into Jesus' healing presence through prayer for rest for my soul. Thank you for sending Jesus to conquer my true enemies of sin, death, and hell. Help me to fix my eyes and hope on Jesus and bank on the truth that you'll never leave me nor forsake me, whether in life or in death. In Jesus' name. Amen.

December 5, 2019 – Faith Lifer

Daily Reading: Psalm 143: 5-8

In this Psalm, we see David remember all that God has done for David and God's chosen people. Before God anointed David as king, he was simply Jesse's youngest son: a shepherd with a humble future in sight. Yet God had bigger plans for David. Many years later, as David wrote this prayer, he was reminded how much he needed God. We can't know what David's specific trouble was in this moment, but we know he turned to God with a thirsty soul in response. When David felt far from God, David cried out to his Father in desperation. David knew a life without God was a life of eternal thirst. By verse 8, David had placed his trust in God once again.

This Advent, like David, we are also reminded of what God has done for us and how much we need Him. When we were dead in our sin, God sent his only Son to save us from ourselves. We rejoice that God came and dwelt among us, even though we never deserved it. We are also humbled and saddened that the King of kings— the Creator of all things—was hated, mocked, rejected, and subjected to a criminal's death when He did dwell among us. Jesus came to us knowing full well that we would reject Him, but our hatred was no match for his love. Like David reminds us, we still need God's love and grace each moment of every day.

Daily Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for sending your Son so that we can come before You without shame. Forgive us for being far from You. Help our souls to thirst for You amid this busy Christmas season. Restore our trust in you and lead us in your will for your glory. To You alone we lift up our souls. In Jesus' name, Amen.


Daily Reading: Psalm 85: 6-11

Daily Reading: Psalm 24: 3-6

While "The Advent Season" of the year is a designated calendar time of celebration and anticipation of the birth of Jesus Christ, I like to view "The Advent Season" as a year-long awareness and hope of the return of our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ. I also like to view this special season as a (Set-Aside Time of Self-Examination)—in regards to my personal developmental relationship in Holiness, Righteousness, and Obedience to our Savior and Lord. This fits squarely into our personal SANCTIFICATION—which is a life-long process. With this in mind, I seek our awareness of "The Advent Season" to last consistently throughout the entire calendar new year in Righteous Obedience. We should then, perhaps, view the Advent Season as a "SHADOW AWARENESS" of our direct responsibility to whole-heartedly commit ourselves to a HOLY, RIGHTEOUS, OBEDIENT life/relationship with our Savior and Lord each day of the New Year.

In Psalms 24, verses -3-6 clearly focus our attention on the 'True Israel'. These verses also bring to our attention that our personal relationship/position before our Savior and Lord is for all people chosen by the Lord as His "Chosen-Elect Beloved—both Jew and Gentile alike." We are reminded that Holiness trumps everything else before the Lord. And, as the 'Chosen-Elect Beloved' of God, we are called upon—as verse 3 boldly declares—that we must seek a life of personal Holiness, Righteousness, and Obedience, purified by the 'Unction of the Holy Spirit' to dwell in the 'HOLY HILL' of the Lord. AMEN.

There are two distinct and separate declarations:

• FIRST, we see an INQUIRY: Who shall ascent into the hill of the Lord? (Who shall be able to stand in His Holy Presence/Place?)

Next, we see the ANSWER to this INQUIRY:
 "He/She that hath clean hands and a pure heart—he/she shall."
 (Shall be allowed to do so.)

I close this brief 'Advent Message' with a special prayer offered by David to the Lord for forgiveness of sin in his life:

Daily Prayer: (Psalm 51:7-12)

"Purify me from my sins and I will be clean, wash me and I will be whiter than snow. Oh, give me back my joy again, you have broken me, now let me rejoice! Don't keep me looking at my sins. Remove the stain of my guilt. Create in me a clean heart, O God. Renew a right spirit within me. Restore to me again the joy of your salvation and make me willing to obey you. AMEN.


December 10, 2019 - Scotty Crawford

Daily Reading: Psalm150: 1-2

Praise Him! As I reflect on praising the Lord during this advent season, I am reminded of an occasion last summer which brought a renewed, yet very different, reason for praise. I want to tell you about Mary.

I spent two weeks in June in Cambridge, Massachusetts while accompanying my husband Richard on a business trip. On my second day there, a homeless woman, about my age, complimented me as I walked by. I smiled, and walked on. I felt the presence of God leading me to go back and talk to her. Her name was Mary. Over the course of two weeks, we visited every day. As she shared the circumstances of how she became homeless, I was overwhelmed with how, just with a few bad happenings, this could happen to me, to so many of us! During our visits, we talked about family (she has a daughter in San Diego who doesn't know her mother is homeless) and so many trivial things like shoes, hair, clothes. She suggested many places to see in Boston, while also showing me how to use the subway app to plan where I wanted to go. We also talked about things like surviving the cold winters, challenges of shelters, job possibilities, and daily living struggles. I asked questions; she asked questions. An unlikely friendship was formed.

As my time in Cambridge was drawing to a close, I searched for something that could provide a bond between us, even though I knew I would probably never see Mary again. I gave her a copy of 'Jesus Calling', the little book, because we had talked about how I could travel light but she traveled heavy with all her belongings with her. I shared that I would be reading every day along with her. Now, as I look to the daily readings in 'Jesus Calling' during the advent season, I am praying that Mary is reading with me.

I lift up praise to the Lord for the gift of a friend. May I always remember that ministry can happen, one person at a time. May I listen to God's call, always, to reach out to minister.

As a postscript to this story, I returned to Boston in October, and the first thing I did was to go in search of Mary. I didn't find her. I did find one of her friends; Mary had disappeared several weeks prior, and no one in the homeless community knew how to reach her. The friend now has my phone number, so maybe one day I will get a call. Nonetheless, I have to believe that Mary has gone to be with her daughter, or a friend, or in some way is no longer homeless. And I pray that during this advent season, she is reading the same words as me, and finding comfort in trusting God.

I have found special comfort in the following beginning words from the December entries of 'Jesus Calling':

Daily Prayer:

I am with you in all that you do.

Your needs and my riches are a perfect fit.

Make me the focal point of your search for security.


I am taking care of you.

Daily Reading: Psalm 150: 3-6

Using our loud voices to support something we love and cherish with the sounds of various instruments in the background— it sounds like an SEC stadium on any given Saturday in the Fall. But this isn't the description of a football game, but rather, a description of our attitude when praising God.

Daily Reading: Psalm 33: 18-22

Daily Reading: Psalm 145: 1-5

In the week before Christmas, we sometimes neglect to think about what the holy day really means. We need an awakening through the weeks in advent. Hopefully it will awaken us with a fresh glimpse of glory, memory and hope. We want to remember the God who became a child.

Psalms gives voice to human emotions. Many of the Bible's main ideas are echoed as the writers offer praise, thanksgiving, faith, hope and sorrow for our sins. True feelings of praising God or complaining in times of trouble shines forth, as one writes in a diary, by reflecting people's most intimate dealings with God.

If you are looking for a reason to praise God, start here. He is ready to listen.

Daily Reading: Psalm 145: 8-9

During this Advent and Christmas Season, we need to wisely consider Scripture, seek the Lord's guidance in our daily lives, and be renewed in joy through praising Him for his greatness and his goodness. Psalms are a great resource for this, as they are full of condensed, practical nuggets of wisdom, and they lead us to pray and sing to God in all circumstances of our lives. My particular Scripture today – two verses from one of David's great songs of praise – repeat one of the Bible's great proclamations of the LORD's goodness through his mercy and love.


Psalm 145 carries the title "Great is the LORD" in the ESV translation and is the first of the final six songs devoted to praise that conclude the Books of Psalms (145-150). We may well know the Lord is great: He is all holy and perfectly righteous, while He is also supremely sovereign and omnipotent. However, if we believe the truth of God's divine greatness, we should not take Him for granted or remain silent about his greatness and all He has done for us. We should daily and continually praise Him. In fact, we grow in faith and are ourselves renewed when we remember all the specific ways in which the Lord is great.

Yet our specific verses for today (Psalm 145:-8-9) lead us still further to rejoice not only in the LORD's *greatness* but also in his *goodness and grace*. These verses repeat one of the wonderful Old Testament proclamations of the LORD's character (see, for example, Exodus 34:6): the Good News of his grace, patience, and mercy and his kindness and goodness to all people.

Advent and Christmas should be a time of reflection and celebration, but if we allow it to get out of control with food, gifts, and concerns about who is going where with whom, this season can become an especially tense one. Psalm 145 and verses 8-9 about God's goodness, patience, mercy and love help us model our behavior after Him. So let us find moments today and each day to take the focus off of ourselves, to take the pressure off of

the holiday season, and to remember the Lord and the grace, mercy and love He showed us. We should think more of other people in this season and consider ways that we could lift someone up, much the way the Lord did for us. Also, we should note that the Lord gives mercy over all that He made; that means that for us to then be unmerciful would be in contradiction to His will for us.

Daily Prayer: Merciful Lord, I pray that You will lead us to be gracious, merciful, patient and loving this Advent and Christmas season. Make us mindful today and each day to give of ourselves and to be kind to those who are struggling. May our positive interaction with friends, family, and colleagues, and the love that results from it reflect your steadfast love and goodness given for us, to us, and through us. In Jesus' Name we pray, Amen

Daily Reading: Psalm 62: 5-8

Waiting is more than a part of Advent season. It's so much of the Christian life. Waiting quietly is antithetical to our nature. We naturally picture waiting as, at best, the bore of standing in long lines. When waiting is inevitable, we naturally try figuring out a solution or escaping from reality. In Psalm 62:5-8, the author, King David assumes that waiting holds an opportunity for profound change. Hear him speak this to himself, his "soul" in verses 5-7. This is the self talk and prayer of the Christian, much like the prayer of Jesus. Then hear David turn to others, repeating and intensifying the same truth in verse 8, urging that God is able and eager to contain our vulnerable hearts and fragile lives.

Like you and I, David sins every day. Like you and I, he witnesses and suffers deep and depressing injustice. Yet amid all kinds of chaos, he waits with hopeful anticipation. How in the world does he do this? It's because amid long waiting, he experiences for himself God's intensely personal and undeniable refuge. He tells himself and me that "at all times", however chaotic, confusing or boring, God is able and eager to give any soul what only God can give: the very quieting, saving presence of God. David's unique waiting foreshadows advent season, giving language to my longing heart -- a heart longing to see the coming Savior, the returning Savior.

Daily Prayer: Returning King, while I groan along with creation, teach me how trustworthy, safe and present you are. Teach me to wait quietly, honestly, and increasingly confident in you amid troubled times. You alone are my salvation. Amen.

December 22, 2019 - Allen Johnson


Last Sunday of Advent


Christmas Eve

Christmas Day

Daily Reading: Psalm 98: 6-9

Joy to the World, the LORD is come! Let earth receive her King! This day is filled with lasting joy, remembrance, and hope. Christmas is perhaps THE day in the year in which our memories and hopes, hearts and minds connect most powerfully with our past, present, and future. The Supreme Source and Light of all those memories and hopes for us as Christians is Jesus. He is the ultimate Christmas Gift. The LORD' gives us his joy – Jesus – Who has come to us as THE Judge, Savior, and King. Amid all the other fun and frenzy of this day, take time to receive HIM.

"Joy to the World! The Lord Is Come!" Isaac Watts did not originally compose those words as a song; Watts most definitely did not pen those words originally as a Christmas Carol. Watts wrote the words of "Joy to the World! The Lord Is Come!" as a poem presenting the message of one of David's great Messianic Psalms, Psalm 98. Watts' poem (published in 1719) was a paraphrased summary of Psalm 98 and Genesis 3:18-19, focused on the ultimate coming of the Messiah (Jesus) to rule as Judge and King not only over the Church but also all nations and peoples and the entire world. Nevertheless, in the 19th Century, Lowell Mason set the second half of Watts' poem to music several times; Mason eventually set the words to the hymn so often treated as a Christmas Carol today. In fact, "Joy to the World! The Lord Is Come!" is now the most published and recorded of all Christmas Carols. In all this, I discern God's providence: in the story of how a poem based on Psalm 98 became eventually the "King" of Christmas Carols. Ultimately, our celebration of Christmas should be all about the King, his coming, and his rule.

"Joy to the World! The Lord Is Come!" Today, receive Him, bow to Him, adore Him, and rejoice forever in God's gift of Joy to the world.

Daily Prayer: Jesus, this day belongs to You; it is all about You.

May I – likewise – belong to You and be all about You. In Your Name, I pray, Amen.

Joy to the World, the LORD is come! Let earth receive her King!
